## A VISION OF HEALTH IN 2021 AND BEYOND

Thank you, first, for calling me and welcoming me as your Pastor. I am delighted to serve God with you. In my view, the health of the church involves healthy connections—as connective tissue runs through the human body and holds it together. Spiritual connections are vital to the health of the body of Christ and enable the church to be the church every day.

Christ gives officers to provide order and stability. I will support the consistory with adequate training and the congregation with effective communication. I will encourage visitation for pastoral and diaconal care, taking the gospel “from house to house” to encourage and pray for all the saints (Acts 2:46; 5:42; 20:20). And I will help the various ministry teams—Worship, Nurture, Outreach, and Mission—to function well. Office bearers and ministry teams are designed to assist all members in the loving exercise of their gifts inside and outside church ‘walls’. In this way, rather than doing all the work, the pastor, consistory, and ministry teams promote the movement and dynamism of the members as a living organism. This also means that the church is a community *on mission*.

My focus, then, is to help the congregation realize its identity as a discipling community with marching orders defined by the Great Commission (Matt 28:16-20). In being shaped by the gospel to think and act biblically, disciples become “mission-fit”—knowing the Lord, becoming like the Lord, and doing the Lord’s will. Mission-fit disciples love and connect with one another and with their neighbors and coworkers through relationship building, service, cultural engagement, and evangelism towards making more disciples. By learning to be disciples who live missionally, I believe we will build communal health and grow numerically.

Healthy growth requires the willingness to assess everything in the light of the gospel: Who are we? Where are we? Who are we called to reach? How will we reach them? The Great Commission charges Christ’s followers with making relevant connections not only within the church but also beyond its circles. Yes, we must assess how worship connects people to God and how nurture connects people to one another.

But do we also connect to neighbors with mercy, hospitality, and compassion? Do we connect to widening spheres of influence by sharing our interests, talents, and skills (e.g., art, music, hobbies, work-related gifts, other means)? To grow, we must envision and implement a variety of gospel messaging and gospel neighboring practices to create ‘front doors’ for disciple-making.

Front doors mean open doors, visible to friends and neighbors. We will improve the website and communications, reach out to inactive members, form missional small groups, engage the community by participating in local events, discover needs via conversations with neighbors and organizations, offer/participate in outreach, educational, and justice efforts/awareness events. In all we do, we will practice radical hospitality and real evangelism to befriend ‘the other’ and share the gospel of Christ. All told, we must *be the church every day*.

- *Communications*: A letter of thanks was received from the Christian Health Care Center for Living Word’s donation out of gratitude for the Fantuzzo family’s stay at the DeRoo House. -

- *Worship*: Christmas Day Service will be @ 10AM. There will be no New Year’s (Eve or Day) Service.

- *Nurture*: A new book study will begin January 10, 2021, using *Everyday Church: Gospel Communities on Mission*, by Tim Chester and Steve Timmis.

The joy of meeting our beloved Saviour, became foremost. Ruth wonderfully bore the load of her care. John’s wife, Dr. Sheryl supplied lots of important advice. Judy called almost every day on FaceTime to keep her, and us encouraged. On August 19th, we were able to celebrate our 65th Wedding Anniversary together. We had a cake, of which she gave me 2 bites, and managed to enjoy the rest by herself. At her last breath she gave my hand one last squeeze, and went to her eternal home. It was not a sad occasion, but one of awaited victory.*

*I had a couple days when I couldn't focus on anything. But, having to finish preparing a message, when I opened the Word of God I was able again to focus my thinking. The Word of God seems more alive and exciting every day. November 26, I turned 88 years old. A special blessing was waiting for me as I sat at the table. Ruth had a card set out for me, from and signed by Ellen! It*

*had a Bible verse, Revelation 3:7, "He that openeth, and no man shutteth, and no man openeth." Her message, "Even if it seems some doors are closing, you haven't missed a thing - - - asking God to open up just the right door for you at just the right time. Love, Ellen". Can you imagine the tears of gratitude that flowed.*

*Doors are still opening. Many still need to hear the message of our precious Lord Jesus Christ. As He gives strength, we will continue to do what we can. We need prayer more than ever.*

*We are in lockdown on the island. there are no cases of corona virus and they want to keep it that way. We are to wear masks at all times outside of the home and we have to let the "authorities" know when we leave the house and the reason why. We can only go to bakeries or grocery stores. The fishermen are not allowed to go fishing, which brings much hardship to many on the island, because that is what they live off. We cannot have more than 6 people in the house. Schools are closed and so is the church.*

*Personally, I think that there are very hard days ahead. But I am thankful that nothing can take God by surprise. He can set limits and say, "Thus far and no further".*

*Amy, my daughter, is in Italy at the moment for some medical treatments for her Down Syndrome son. He is coming back with her to Greece for a few months. We are not allowed to have guests, which is not too difficult for us at this time of the year in that there are no guests coming. It is windy and rainy and real winter weather.*

*We appreciate your continued support and prayers. Our prayer for you is that the Lord will be near you and that this virus will not upset your church services.*

Beautiful Star of Bethlehem shine on.


Beautiful Star, the hope of rest, for the redeemed, the good, the blest,
